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8th AF Sending 10 Groups to The Continent

Although no large-scale movement has begun as yet, the 8th Air Force made known yesterday that ten of its operational groups, consisting of some 25,000 men and more than 750 aircraft, were on their way to the Continent for duty there.

Seven of its groups are heavy bombardment outfits equipped with Forts. They include the 92nd, 94th, 96th, 100th, 305th, 306th and 384th. Three Mustang fighter groups—the 55th, 355th and 357th—also are included.

Advance parties from some of the groups are already at their Continental bases, it was disclosed. Movement of the 55th and 355th Fighter groups, however, has been completed. And except for its ground forces, all 357th personnel have arrived at their European base.

Latest figures disclosed by USSTAF showed that approximately 55 per cent of the VE-Day total of 8th AF personnel has been redeployed to U.S., leaving slightly more than 75,000 8th AF men and women still in the ETO.

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Bomb groups said to have recently completed their movements to the US, are the 44th, 91st, 93rd, 351st, 381st, 389th, 392nd, 398th, 401st, 445th, 446th, 448th, 453rd, 457th, 458th, 466th, 467th, 482nd, 489th and 491st.

Since VE-Day almost 100,000 men and more than 2,200 heavy bombers of the 8th have been redeployed to the U.S.

Following fighter groups are still in the U.K.: the 4th, 20th, 56th, 78th, 339th, 352nd, 353rd, 356th, 359th, 361st and the 471st, according to USSTAF

Tuna Keviews Show in Berlin

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40 Tons of Map Paper Stolen from Com Z Hq

PARIS, July 22—Forty tons of unused Army map paper valued at \$80,000 were stolen from the warehouse of the Engineer Intelligence Division near Com Z Headquarters during May and allegedly sold to a French printer for \$80,000, records at the Seine Base Section Provost Marshal's office disclosed yesterday.

Thirty tons of the paper have been recovered. Before they could be traced ten tons were used in a printing job.

Col. C. W. Buhrmaster, Seine Base Section Provost Marshal, said no American soldier was implicated in the theft.
